# 1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

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## 1.1 INTRODUCTION

### **Location of the College:**

Syed Ammal Arts and Science College is run by the Syed Ammal Educational Trust established by the “Father of Ramanathapuram” Dr. E. M. Abdullah in the name of his beloved mother Syed Ammal. The College is situated in a vast area of about 10 acres on the East coast road between Ramanathapuram and Devipattinam.

### **Institutional Functioning:**

Syed Ammal Arts and Science College is a self financing and Co- educational leading higher education institution Affiliated to Alagappa University Karaikudi. This college was started in the year 2010 with the strength of 310 students. Now the college has the strength of 2758 students with 91 well qualified and experienced teachers. This institution is offering 15 under graduate programmes and 6 post graduate programmes. The college creates an ideal academic atmosphere of intellectual vigor and moral rectitude in which the students may find their academic fulfillment and achieve greatness as eminent citizens. The students are having the opportunity of learning more job-oriented and applied programmes like Fashion Technology and Costume Designing, Visual Communication and Microbiology.

This institution provides higher and Skill-based education to the poor and downtrodden people of this backward district and also creates and disseminates knowledge to the students through unique learning experience for serving the society and also for the betterment of humanity.

The Vision of the College is to make the rural students as potential and transformative academicians in higher education.

### **Mission**

Generating an enabling environment for academic excellence through quality education. Moulding the rural students into professionally competent, intellectually proficient and employable force through Curricular, Co-curricular and Extra-Curricular activities. Creating globally talented human resources with ethical outlook and moral values, for the larger benefits of the society.

## 1.2 Strength, Weakness, Opportunity and Challenges(SWOC)

### **Institutional Strength**

1. This College is one of the best Co-Education Institutions to provide UG and PG quality education to the poor students of this backward area.

2. This is the only college offering 15 UG and 6 PG programmes to cater the needs of the higher education in the surrounding area.
3. This College has been producing more number of University Ranks than the other affiliated colleges situated in the surrounding area. In the academic year 2018-2019, our college has secured 36 University Ranks.
4. The college is having enough classrooms, well equipped laboratories and ICT enabled classrooms.
5. Transport facilities are provided to all the students coming from remote areas of the district.
6. Latest programmes such as B.Sc. Visual Communication, B.Sc., Microbiology and B.Sc. Fashion Technology and Costume Designing have been introduced in this college in the surrounding area for the betterment of the rural students.

### **Institutional Weakness**

1. Syllabus framing authority is the University.
2. Being a self finance institution financial sources are limited.
3. Being an Affiliated College, Diploma, PG diploma and Certificate programmes may not be introduced.
4. Though the college has introduced well advanced and employable programmes such as Fashion Technology and Costume Designing and Visual Communication, the students of this backward area have not understood the importance of these programmes.
5. Research facilities are limited.

### **Institutional Opportunity**

1. To provide higher education and research attitudes to the poor and rural students of this backward district.
2. The College has introduced many job oriented courses such as Microbiology, Visual Communication and Fashion Technology and Costume Designing.
3. The management of this institution provides special fee concession for meritorious plus two students
4. Well experienced and qualified teachers are working in this institution.
5. Transport facilities are provided by the management to the nook and corner of this district.
6. Encouragement is given to all faculty members for doing research works.
7. Fund is mobilized for organizing Seminars / Conferences / Workshops from the Indian Science Congress Association.
8. This institution provides very good opportunities to the students in various sports activities.

### **Institutional Challenge**

1. Being a self financing institution fund mobilization is not easy.
2. Increasing financial burden to the management for the academic development of the college.
3. Severe academic competition is there due to the entry of many Colleges.

## **1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY**

### **Curricular Aspects**

The motto of Syed Ammal Arts and Science College is Education with Discipline. The vision of the college is to make rural students as potential and transformative academicians in higher education. Apart from dealing core subjects, value added and Skill-based courses are also included for ameliorating the efficiency and employability of the students. To inculcate the moral values and the importance of conservation of environment Value Education and Environmental studies are also included in the curriculum. The college is having an Internal Quality Assessment Cell (IQAC) which monitors the effective implementation of the curriculum. All UG and PG programmes are following the semester pattern and Choice Based Credit System (CBCS). Our Students are taking up Internships, Industrial Visits and Field Projects. In order to assess the outcome of the curricula, feedback is received from the Students, Teachers and Alumni.

### **Teaching-learning and Evaluation**

The college offers 15 UG and 6 PG programmes in Arts, Science and Commerce. The admission of students to various programmes is based on merits and reservation norms prescribed by the Tamil Nadu state government and the guidelines given by the Alagappa University. Skilled persons in Sports, differently abled persons are also given priorities in the admission process. The college adopts measures such as student monitoring system, paper presentations and bridge courses. The institution has a continuous assessment by way of conducting Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA), giving assignments and conducting seminars. 25 marks are given for CIA. In order to maintain a cordial academic environment, the institution has established Anti-Ragging committee and Grievance Redressal Cell.

### **Research, Innovations and Extension**

This institution gives utmost importance to carryout research works. The college is providing a conducive atmosphere for doing basic research. The department of microbiology has done a minor research project entitled "Load of Microbial Pollution and portability of Drinking Water". This project is highly useful for creating hygienic awareness to the public. All the faculty members are encouraged to participate and submit Research papers in International, National and State Level Seminars and Conferences. On behalf of our institution, the Department of Microbiology has prepared a report about the innovative and Research works carried out in this institution and sent to the Tamil Nadu government for Green Award. Among the affiliated colleges of Alagappa University, our college is the only college which has sent the report for that award.

The various faculties of this institution have published 13 Research papers in UGC notified journals. The college is having two units of NSS with 200 volunteers. Many Extension and Community Welfare Programmes are carried over by the NSS and YRC units of this college.

### **Infrastructure and Learning Resources**

This college is having all the infrastructure facilities for the educational processes. This institution is having classrooms, laboratories and one English language lab. The college provides technologically enabled learning process, network facilities and well furnished computer laboratories. This institution has a very good library with a reading room for faculty members and students. There is a vast play ground situated in front of the college to avail sports activities. Facilities for physical exercise, indoor and outdoor games are also available in the college. A well equipped conference hall and a spacious auditorium are also available for conducting council meetings, seminars and conferences. The college has installed alternative energy sources such as Solar

Lights and Biogas Plant.

### **Student Support and Progression**

The college is providing a hand book (calendar) which gives all information regarding admission and other support systems available to the students. The academic calendar is hosted in the website of the college. This institution is having total student strength of **1068** boys and **1690** girls belonging SC, BC, OBC and general categories. 91 well qualified and experienced teachers are handling the classes. The college is having a tutorial system. Through this system the students are given counseling in academic and non-academic areas. Bridge courses are conducted to all the first year UG students to enhance the communicative ability in English. The college supports the economically backward students in getting scholarships from the Tamil Nadu government. Apart from this the Syed Ammal Trust also provides financial assistance to the poor and meritorious students to continue their higher education. 274 students are given this monetary support for the last five academic years.

The students of Microbiology are also given many training programmes like Mushroom culture to get self employment opportunities. Bus facilities are provided to all the students to reach the college in time. A spacious and hygienic Canteen is available inside the college premises. A health centre, Xerox facilities are also available for the benefit of the students. Our college is having a RO water plant for providing drinking water to the students. The College is maintaining a hygienic condition in providing Toilet facilities to the students.

### **Governance, Leadership and Management**

This institution has effective, integrated and co-ordinated decision making system of committees. These committees will look after different levels of functioning such as budgeting, scheduling and planning of academic activities. The Vision, Mission and objectives of the college are achieved through efficient management, potential leadership and the best governance. The IQAC of the college under the able guidance of the management and the principal is implementing and evaluating the academic policies. The college has organized 25 International, National and State level Seminars, Conferences and Workshops for the last five years. A feedback from the students, Teachers and Alumni is available in the college in order to receive vital information for the institutional development.

### **Institutional Values and Best Practices**

The students are provided opportunity of studying and writing methods to get good marks in their final examinations. Periodical monthly and model tests are conducted to make them to achieve many university ranks. Every year our college is getting more university ranks. Last year this college produced 36 University ranks and stood first in the Alagappa University. To achieve their academic excellence the students are having the chance of participating in seminars, conferences, workshops and group discussion.

To provide higher education to the poor students, the management of this institution gives fee concession to these students who have got thousand marks and above in the plus two examinations. Since our college is situated in a backward area most of the parents are unable to pay the collage fees fully at the time of admission. Considering their poverty, such parents are allowed to pay fees in three or four installments. Dr.EM.Abdullah and his sons and daughters have been doing this academic service for so many years in our district to up lift the poor students in learning their higher education. Hence Dr.EM.Abdullah and the Syed Ammal Trust will be

remembered by all the students and their parents with full of gratitudes and thanks.

The Department of Microbiology is giving training to the students for Mushroom Culture, in order to create self employment opportunity after the completion of their degree. The same department is also maintaining an herbal garden with rare medicinal plants which are highly useful to the human beings. The institution has initiated more rain water harvesting process and the conserved and stored rain water in a pond situated very near to the college campus is used by the Department of Zoology for culturing fresh water fishes. This college is having a Health Centre for providing preliminary medical treatment to the students, teaching and non teaching staff. The college is having Solid Waste Management System to keep the premises clean. An Eco park with 100 plants is maintained by this institution to make a green campus.

##### 1.1.2 The institution adheres to the academic calendar including for the conduct of CIE

###### Response:

Every year the college prepares the academic calendar. The calendar gives all the details of academic functioning. The date of reopening of the college, commencement of classes and the holidays are noted in the calendar. According to the pattern of Alagappa University, an academic year is having **Two Semesters** and each semester is consisting of 90 working days. Academic planning of the institution is strictly adhered to the university pattern. With the able guidance of the Principal and the HODs the syllabi are distributed to the members of the concerned department. They have to complete the syllabus within the stipulated period. Before the commencement of the semester examination, the internal examinations will be conducted. The principal convenes a meeting with all HODs and IQAC members to decide the dates and time table of the internal examinations. All the subject handling teachers are asked to prepare question papers for conducting the internal examinations. The time table and the dates of examinations according to the college calendar are properly informed to the students of various departments through notice board. Usually the first internal examination will be conducted in the month of July.

The question papers prepared by the faculty members will be verified by the heads of department in relation with the university pattern and also the allotment of marks for each section of the question paper.

The valued answer papers will be issued to the students and if there will be any correction that will be done by the concerned staff member. The internal assessment marks are given to the students purely based on the performance of the students and is absolutely transparent. The marks obtained by the students are displayed in the departmental notice board. Model examinations are conducted after completing the syllabus. The seminars and workshops are periodically conducted by all the departments and also through startup cell. These seminars and workshops are creating very good opportunity to the students to develop their academic enrichment.

This college has a Tutorial System of Internal Assessment in all the academic functions. A particular staff is nominated for a group of students. The student performance is continuously evaluated. Internal examinations and University Model Examination are regularly conducted in a semester.

The students are informed about the unitized syllabus, the pattern of University Questions and the allotment of marks for each question from the beginning of the semester. After conducting the tests, the papers are valued by the concerned staff member. The valued papers are given to the students. If any

student demands for more marks for his right answer it may be considered. Then after, the marks are entered in the internal assessment mark register by the tutor concerned. If there is any problem in the internal examination, it is solved within two days.

**University level:**

The University is conducting the semester examinations on the month of November and April every year. After the university examination is over, the paper valuation is conducted. In the university examinations if a student is not satisfied with the valuation of the examiner, he can apply for re-evaluation within fifteen days from the date of the publication of results. A student can also apply for the photocopy of his/her answer paper and get it revalued. Revaluation is not applicable for practical examinations and project works. Sports students are given special permission for writing their University examination as per university norms.

The second main source of Income is the fees collected from the students. The fees collected from the students are utilized for salaries of the teaching and non teaching staff. The infrastructure facilities provided for conducting Police selection examinations and TNPSC examinations will make the institution to get additional income that can also be utilized for the development of the college. For conducting conferences and seminars, our college is getting funds from the Indian Science Congress Association Chennai Chapter.

As per the guidelines of NAAC this college has established an Internal Quality Assurance Cell. IQAC has been constituted with a co-ordinator and all HODs as members. The quality and other academic performances of the different faculties are periodically monitored by the IQAC. Monthly and internal tests are regularly conducted. All the faculties are advised to organize state level, national level seminars by inviting eminent resource persons. PTA meetings will be conducted to inform the academic performance of the students to the parents. The academic performances are continuously assessed by the IQAC and the tutorial system of the concerned department. The teachers have been provided the opportunity to participate in the refresher and orientation courses for updating their subject knowledge. year 2018-2019 they have secured 36 ranks in the Alagappa University.

This college has an Internal Quality Assurance Cell. It plays a key role in reviewing the quality of teaching and the course out comes periodically. Quality initiatives and starting of new PG and UG Programmes for the academic need of the students are reviewed every year.

The college was started in the year 2010 with 10 undergraduate Programmes. After three years there was a need for the conventional PG Programmes like M.Sc Mathematics and M.A. English. These two PG Programmes were started after getting affiliation from the Alagappa University. In the academic year 2016 – 2017 M.Com (CA) programme was started. In order to provide employment opportunities for the students of this backward area, B.Sc Microbiology & B.Sc Zoology degree Programmes were started. All the departments have organized seminars and conferences for the development and research attitudes of the students. One more NSS unit was started with the already existing one. The two NSS units conducted many community oriented programs. To enhance the quality of learning in English bridge course and remedial classes are conducted. Soft skill and spoken English classes are also conducted regularly to update the knowledge of the students. In the academic year 2017 – 2018 two new Programmes such as B.Sc Visual Communication and B.Sc Fashion Technology and Costume Designing were started in order to create employment opportunities to the students of this backward area. In the year 2019-2020, M.Sc Zoology programme was started due to the high demand of the local Undergraduate students. Extension of Library was made with more books and Journals. Many national and state level conferences were conducted for the betterment of student community. More number of tree saplings were planted to make the institution a green campus. A well equipped conference hall and a very big auditorium have been constructed for conducting seminars, conferences and other academic activities. Bus facilities are provided to the nook and corner of the district with concessional transport fees. In the year 2019 - 2020 an Alumni association was started and a meeting was held.

### 3. The practices

The main objective of the institution is to provide quality and skill based higher education to the poor and downtrodden students of this backward district. The heads of the various faculties and their staff members are focusing and enhancing their teaching methodologies to uplift the subject knowledge of the students for getting distinction and awards in the university examinations. The students are provided opportunity of studying and writing methods to get good marks in their final examinations. Periodical monthly and model tests are conducted to make them to achieve many university ranks. Every year our college is getting more university ranks. Last year our college got 36 university ranks and stood first in the Alagappa University. To achieve their academic excellence the students are having the chance of participating in seminars, conferences, workshops and group discussion.

To provide higher education to the poor students, the management of this institution gives fee concession to these students who have got thousand marks and above in the plus two examinations. Since our college is situated in a backward area most of the parents are unable to pay the collage fees fully at the time of admission. Considering their poverty, such parents are allowed to pay fees in three or four installments. Thousands of poor students are benefitted and finished their degrees and post graduate degrees with distinction.

Since our institution is a self financing one there is no possibility of getting financial assistance either from the government or from private sources. Even though for the betterment of poor and downtrodden students, the financial burden has been individually faced by the management. Many poor students who have finished their higher education from their institution have occupied a very good position in their life. Dr.EM.Abdullah and his sons and daughters have been doing this academic service for so many years in our district to up lift the poor students in learning their higher education. Hence Dr.EM.Abdullah and the Syed Ammal Trust will be remembered by all the students and their parents with full of gratitudes and thanks.

The Department of Microbiology is giving training to the students for Mushroom Culture, in order to create self employment opportunity after the completion of their degree. The same department is also maintaining an herbal garden with rare medicinal plants which are highly useful to the human beings. The institution has initiated rain water harvesting process and the conserved and stored rain water in a pond situated very near to the college campus is used by the Department of Zoology for culturing fresh water fishes. The storage of water in the pond may be utilized by the college during the summer season and also to increase the ground water level of the surrounding area. This college is having a Health Centre for providing preliminary medical treatment to the students, teaching and non teaching staff. The college is having Solid Waste Management System to keep the premises clean. An Eco park with 100 plants is maintained by this institution to make a green campus.

### 4. Problem encountered and resources required.

To carry out the above mentioned best practices many difficulties have been faced. Especially, in collecting raw materials and spawns for culturing mushroom. Since the college is situated in the salt content area, cultivation of the herbal plants is not very easy. After removing two feet top salt soil the pits were filled with humus soil for the better growth of the medicinal plants. It is also a problem to transport the fishes from the catchment areas to the pond of this college. The separation of decomposable and non decomposable materials from the solid waste is a cumbersome process.
